

TIPPERARY ATHLETES



Martin Egan

Martin Egan was born on 23 September 1920 at Attifineen, Shanaglish, near Gort, County Galway. He was the fifth son of Martin Egan, a farmer, and Margaret Egan (née Campbell). His parents got married on 12 September 1912 in Shanaglish church. In the 1930s the family moved to Cregboy, Shanaglish, which is a mile from the home place, and Martin and his siblings attended the local Lurga National School. Martin Egan won his first national senior medal at the age of nineteen when he was a scoring member of the Clare-based Feakle AC that won the Irish inter-club cross-country championship at Limerick in 1940. The winner was clubmate Patrick 'Pato' O'Halloran, and another of the scoring six was Liam Loughnane, uncle of hurling man Ger Loughnane. There was no championship held the following year due to an outbreak of foot and mouth disease in the country. In both 1942 and 1943 not only was Martin Egan the winner of the national cross-country championship but he led Feakle AC to win as first club. From then on he ran with Galway athletic clubs, and in early 1946 shortly after the end of the cross-country season he started working in Tipperary at the Ballingarry mines and he joined Coolquill AC. He most certainly had a successful track season in his first few months with the Tipperary club by winning seven Irish titles throughout that summer. On 4 August 1946 he competed at the Irish athletics championships, held in Dundalk, and won the 4 miles title by taking 5.8 seconds off Tommy Conneff's fifty-nine year-old Irish record with 19:38.6. During his time with Coolquill AC his best performance in the Tipperary cross-country championships was eleventh in 1947. Another national cross-country medal he won was when he was a scoring member of the Kilconieron AC team, from Galway, that won the Irish inter-club cross-country championship in 1952. Martin Egan died on 9 November 2006, aged eighty-six, and is interred in Shanaglish cemetery.
